Virginia Alice Cottey Stockard became a P.E.O. in 1926, joining Chapter DW, Missouri. Although she initially felt she was too old to become a new member, she was very interested in the educational purpose of the Sisterhood and believed that she could contribute some service because of her years of experience. As she learned the extent of the Sisterhood's purpose, it occurred to her that Cottey College might become a real asset to P.E.O., and she believed that with P.E.O. members in every part of the country, the power of this relationship would be unlimited.

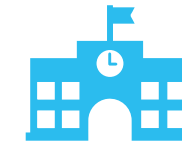

A Cottey Education

emphasizes high academic standards with unique opportunities for personal growth through residential, cultural, and intellectual experiences.

Students may apply to Cottey College as early as April of their junior year. Students must have at least a 2.6 GPA and must be taking a college preparatory curriculum at their high school – meaning they will have 4 years of English, 2 years of the same foreign language, 3 years of mathematics, 2 years of science, and 2 years of history and government. Cottey is currently test-optional. ACT and/or SAT scores are not required to be considered for admission, however, are welcome to help more fully understand a student's academic profile.

In reviewing applications, Cottey performs a holistic assessment using GPA, test scores (if available), recommendations, activities, goals, and character. Overall, the College seeks to admit students whose interests and aspirations match the opportunities provided by Cottey and who will contribute to Cottey's unique educational environment. To apply, go to cottey.edu/apply



We invite all interested students to Experience Cottey, an individualized, year-round visit opportunity for high school girls. Our goal is to highly personalize your Cottey visit experience. Schedule a visit with options like:

- One free hotel room for students who are located 100 miles or greater from campus
- Lunch in Raney Dining Room (expenses paid for by the College for student and parents) with a Golden Key (current Cottey student) and to ask any questions they may have
- Meeting with the President (if she is on campus and available)
- Visit bag with Cottey goodies
- Reserved parking space during the visit
- Photo on campus
- Spirit Shop coupon
- Chellie Club coffee shop drink

Students will also be given the opportunity to meet with a faculty member or attend a class if they choose to do so. Students may bring guests to experience Cottey along with them. High school seniors who visit and who subsequently enroll will earn a \$1,500 annual scholarship for up to four years, so a total of \$6,000! To register, students should complete the form on the Cottey website at cottey.edu/visit.

Additionally, Cottey will continue to offer **Scholars Day** from October 1 to November 30. High academic achievers are invited to attend Cottey's Scholars Day either in person or via Zoom. This event is designed to celebrate high school achievements and reward students with the opportunity to earn up to a full tuition scholarship through an essay competition and interviews with current Cottey scholars and faculty.

LEADERSHIP IMMERSIONS

Leadership Immersions involve intensive academic study or personal enrichment travel experiences that relate directly to the areas of women’s leadership, social responsibility, and/or global awareness. Funds are available to individual students or groups of students who have declared a baccalaureate major, with preference given to faculty-led experiences.

SUMMER LEADERSHIP INTERNSHIPS

Funds are made available to students who have declared a baccalaureate major to focus on an in-depth exploration of leadership from within a community, governmental, political, or non-profit organization. Students are expected to develop meaningful internship experiences in partnership with identified supervisors. Students showcase their experience at a campus presentation in the fall following the internship.

UNDERGRADUATE RESEARCH GRANTS

Grants are made available to students and faculty to focus on research projects related to the study of leadership and leadership development within their academic discipline. Undergraduate research funding is designed to support students who have declared a baccalaureate major and are poised to make an intellectual or creative contribution to her discipline.

Community

The Cottey community is the cornerstone of the experience here. Our students are at home in a supportive environment where classmates, suitemates, faculty, and staff build a sense of belonging.

Academic Excellence

At Cottey, academic excellence is both a mission and a standard, and is attainable because you share this vision for each Cottey student. Cottey is able to provide students with robust opportunities in and outside the classroom, from state-of-the-art facilities, excursion classes, immersion experiences, and more. Cottey is academic excellence, a place where academic pursuit is a goal, and more importantly, a mindset.

Committed

The mission of our founder, Virginia Alice Cottey, to offer excellent educational opportunities to women, has become the inspiration of many. Cottey is committed to this calling. These exceptional opportunities are possible because the promise your support provides. Cottey is able to make these extraordinary opportunities available to more women. Scholarships allow students to focus on what is most important: their goals.

Globally Minded

Our students come from across the United States and all over the world; likewise, our faculty bring diverse backgrounds to the Cottey community. Taking classes, participating in suite life, or eating in Raney Dining Room is often a global experience and introduces each student to the concept of global awareness. Cottey is globally minded, and this is possible because of you. Cottey is intentional in diversifying the way students learn, through supporting students on study abroad, sponsoring the annual multicultural festival, to even the long-celebrated international experience, which reinforces the belief that we are all part of something greater and bigger than ourselves.

Empowering

Empowerment is more than a slogan or a lofty goal. It's inspiring someone to meet their potential with the encouragement to imagine more and achieve their goals. The Cottey environment is particularly designed to stimulate growth for each student. Here, leadership is viewed as skillset that can be developed, not as a role that is limited to a select few. Cottey is empowering. Leadership promotion and student empowerment is everywhere across campus, from the courts and playing fields, to classrooms, in clubs and organizations, and more.



Tuition and fees account for 45 percent of Cottey College’s operating budget with P.E.O. dues contributing an additional five percent. The balance is met through a result of philanthropy including donations to The Cottey Fund, individual contributions, gifts from P.E.O. chapters, and from interest earned on endowments.

CHAPTER GIVING

The project gifts for Cottey that chapters prioritize in their budgets are a vital source of annual revenue for the College and help Cottey achieve a balanced budget every year. Many chapters have also established endowed or named funds at Cottey College, which they continue to grow through additional gifts to the College.

INDIVIDUAL GIFTS

If you wish to make a personal gift to Cottey, you may send your gift directly to the College and receive chapter credit. When you provide your chapter affiliation, your gift is credited to your chapter on a report on giving provided by the Office

of Institutional Advancement to state, provincial, and district treasurers three times per year. The College only releases a name with a gift amount when specifically directed to do so.

P.E.O./ALUMNAE GIVING

If you are an alumna who is also a P.E.O., you have the opportunity to receive triple credit for your contributions to Cottey. By making gifts directly to the College, both your chapter and your class receive credit, as well as tax credits for your charitable gift.

DOUBLE YOUR GIFT

Many companies offer matching gift programs to encourage employees, retirees, and sometimes their spouses to contribute to charitable organizations. Some also provide matching funds for volunteer hours. Companies use various methods for requesting matching funds, so for the best information, contact your company’s human resources office. As an accredited college, Cottey is eligible for most companies’ programs, as long as

donor contributions are made directly to the College; however, gifts for Cottey that are made through the P.E.O. Foundation or a local chapter are usually ineligible for matching.

SUITE SUPPORT

Colorado became the first state to sponsor the furnishing of a suite in 1937. Since then, other states or provinces have joined in this opportunity to support the College by sponsoring suites financially and with student support throughout the academic year. There are presently 34 suites, all named in honor of the state chapters or donors who initially provided funds to establish an endowment. Rosemary Suite is endowed by the Cottey College Alumnae Association. Refurbishing the common living areas are financed through the earnings from permanently held funds and bedroom furnishings are refurbished with funds raised specifically for that purpose.



CASH

Generally a cash gift may be deducted from your federal income tax return in the year your gift is made as long as you itemize deductions. Actual savings from the deduction will vary. Gifts may be made by cash or online by credit card. They may be one-time gifts, an annual contribution or monthly recurring gifts.

STOCK TRANSFER

If stock or other property has increased in value and you have owned it for long enough for it to qualify as a long-term capital asset, you may contribute it to Cottey College and avoid capital gains taxes.

PROPERTY THAT HAS LOST VALUE

In the case of assets that have lost value, you may benefit from selling the property, taking the loss for tax purposes and then contributing the cash to Cottey. This will allow for a deduction for the loss and the charitable gift.

IRA ROLLOVER

If you are 70½ years old or older, you can take advantage of a simple way to benefit Cottey College and receive tax benefits in return. You can give up to \$10,000 from your IRA directly to Cottey College without having to pay income taxes on the money.

UNDESIGNATED GIFTS

Undesignated gifts support the Cottey Fund. Gifts to the Cottey Fund supplement Cottey's annual operating budget and provide a flexible and instantly available source of funding that can be used when and where it is needed the most. These contributions help cover the cost of financial aid, enhancements to the campus, and the services that Cottey provides at no additional cost to students. These amenities include such things as student wellness programs, tutoring in the writing center, coffee in the library, admission to performances and athletic events, music lessons, and technical assistance from Cottey's IT staff. Gifts to the Cottey Fund impact all students, faculty, and staff.

DESIGNATED GIFTS

Gifts may also be designated to a specific program, group, or priority area at Cottey. These gifts give the donor the satisfaction of supporting a program that has personal significance to him or her. Designated and restricted gifts may be labeled for current use or endowment. Current use gifts provide funds for immediate use, whereas endowment gifts are designed to provide financial security over a longer period of time.

THE WISHLIST

The Wishlist is comprised of items that cannot be funded out of the operating budget. They may be items that faculty or staff would like for their programs to support our student's coursework and co-curricular activities or supplies and equipment that enhance campus grounds and facilities. The Wishlist is updated on a regular basis as new wishes are requested. Our students, faculty and staff are truly grateful for your gifts that result in their wishes coming true!

ENDOWED FUNDS

Establishing an endowment is a powerful way to make a lasting gift to Cottey College. These are essentially never-ending donations because the principal is invested and only the interest is used by the College to support a specific program or purpose. This type of gift allows the corpus of the gift to remain intact, thereby ensuring the future strength and viability of the College. Endowments may be established for almost any educational or related purpose at Cottey. They may support faculty chairs, scholarships, leadership and cultural programs or other programs of the donor's choosing. Earnings on unrestricted endowments help to support the general operations of the College.

SCHOLARSHIPS

Gifts for scholarships make it possible for Cottey College to recruit outstanding young women who benefit from an education that is both personal and demanding. There are two ways of establishing a scholarship at Cottey:

- An Endowed Scholarship can be established with an outright gift or through a gift from your estate. The minimum contribution for an endowed scholarship is \$10,000, which is invested with the College's other endowments and the interest is awarded annually. This allows the fund to continue in perpetuity and provide scholarships for many generations of Cottey students.
- A Named Fund Scholarship may be established with a minimum gift of \$5,000. Unlike an endowed scholarship, the principal is not invested and all funds are awarded over a pre-determined number of years. Scholarships may be limited to students with criteria agreed upon by you and the College; however, scholarships the College can award without restriction are most flexible and beneficial. Both endowed and named fund scholarships may be established in your name, your family's name, or the name of your chapter or to honor another individual.

PLANNED GIFTS

Just as Cottey College has ensured incredible futures for women for nearly 135 years, you may wish to provide for the future of your loved ones and for causes you care about. Having an estate plan in place allows for the

communication of the legacy and the values that you wish to endure.

Popular Legacy Gifts

- Gifts by Bequest - You name Cottey College as a beneficiary in your will or trust, designating the gift of your choice (cash, real estate, personal property, or securities)
- Gifts by Beneficiary Designation - Request a change of beneficiary form from the company holding your assets (your IRA, 401(k) and other retirement plans, bank accounts, commercial annuities, life insurance policies) and include Cottey as a full or partial beneficiary.

- You maintain control of your assets during your lifetime and can save on income taxes, capital gains taxes, and estate taxes.
- No minimum gift is required and every gift makes a difference.
- Your gift ensures that your legacy of empowering women through education lives on for many years to come.

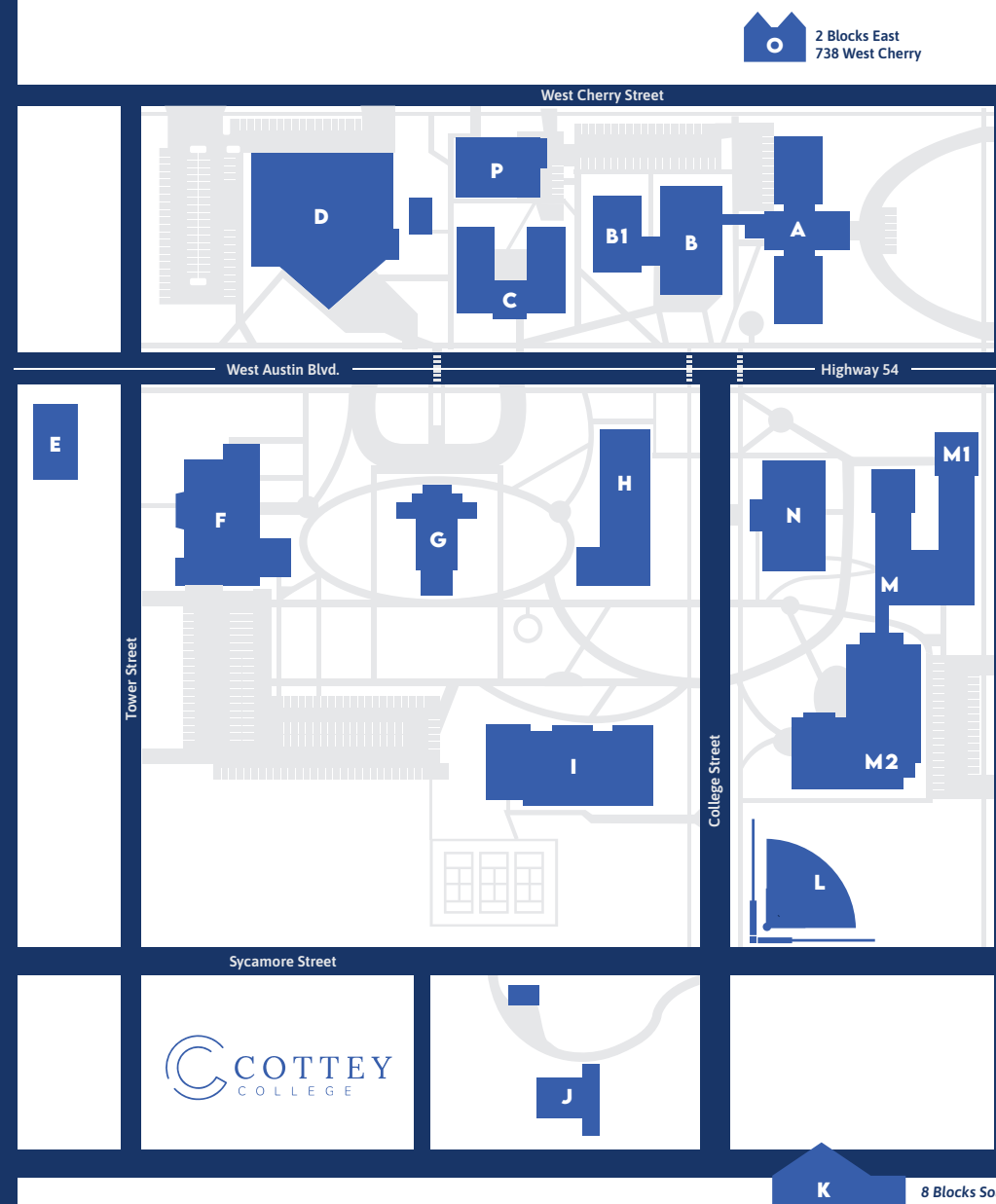
