INCREDIBLE RANKINGS



The tallies are in, and Cottey is ranked #1 Best Regional College in the Midwest by U.S. News and World Report 2022–2023.

It's the the second time in three years we've been #1 in the most important category for our region—Best College. This category focuses on the undergraduate experience and a broad range of programs,

including business, education, the sciences, and humanities. It is a true test of a liberal arts curriculum.

To add to the honor, Cottey was in the same category as both public and private colleges; in total, the publication ranked 86 colleges from 12 states in the Midwest region. Cottey is one of five schools in Missouri to be ranked in the top 50 for the Best Regional College in the Midwest category.



GROWTH



For the third straight year, Cottey College is pleased to announce that enrollment for the fall 2022 semester is up. Cottey saw an increase of 3%, from 303 students last fall to 313 students for the fall 2022 semester. Taking a larger view, Cottey has seen a 22% increase in total enrollment from fall 2019 to fall 2022.

Additionally, producing globally minded leaders is a key component of Cottey's mission. That's why we are proud to draw students from 38 states and 17 countries.



FORENSIC DOLLHOUSES

This semester, criminology students took inspiration from famous female scientist Frances Glessner Lee and created dollhouse dioramas depicting violent crimes. Lee, known as the "mother of forensic science," used elaborate dollhouses to train law enforcement professionals, beginning in the 1940s.





For the assignment, students divided into groups and each group constructed a detailed dollhouse in which they recreated a crime scene, making sure to leave clues that would tell the story. Each group then gave a briefing on their dollhouse to simulate the information a police officer would receive before an investigation.

The projects were displayed in the Rubie Burton Academic Center on November 15, and each criminology student inspected their classmates' dollhouses, searching for clues and solving the crimes.

ESPORTS

The Comets Esports program, in its third year, had its most successful season to date, winning their first National Association of Collegiate Esports (NACE) match in program history. Esports Valorant also qualified for the playoffs for the first time in school history. They then went on to pull off an upset, beating the fourth seed, Capital Tech University (MD). This win moved them into the semifinals to play top-seed Ozark Technical College (OTC). In fall 2022, the Comets Esports program joined the Flag Football Comets in becoming a member of the Kansas Collegiate Athletic Conference (KCAC).

VOLLEYBALL

The volleyball program finished the season 20-14. In their first season as a member of the American Midwest Conference (AMC), the Comets finished in 4th place in the regular season standings. Finishing in the top 4 secured hosting a quarterfinal match at home. The Comets success on the court garnered individual honors for several players, including First Team All-Conference honors to Kaylee Criswell and Aliya Dawson, Honorable Mention to Staley Stallaby, Magdalen Dougherty, and Alesia Cooley. Kaylee Criswell also earned Newcomer of the Year and Mariah Aldrich was named to the Champions of Character All-Conference Team.

CROSS COUNTRY

The cross country program finished the season in 4th place in their first year in the American Midwest Conference (AMC). The team's average was 20:55, an 11-second improvement from last year's conference team finish.

The fall brought team success to the Comets, seeing them win the Cottey College Invitational. Individually, the Comets ran some of the best times in school history, including:

- Freshman Madalenn Fee ran 19:36 at the Haskell Invitational on October 8th, the 6th all-time fastest 5K finish in school history
- Madalenn Fee finished 2nd overall at Baker's Maple Leaf 4K Invitational with a time of 15:40, Cottey's new 4K school record.
- Senior Ella Page ran 19:50 at the AMC Championships, the 10th all-time fastest 5K finish in school history.

Fall 2022 marked the launch of the Cottey Champions Club. an exclusive membership for supporters of Cottey athletics. HINKHOUSE RENOVATION

Hinkhouse underwent a series of renovations over the summer and fall of 2022. The facelift includes new blue bleachers in Hinkhouse Gymnasium. These bleachers are equipped with stairs and railings to improve the safety of spectators, as well as being ADA compliant. Conference banners with AMC institutions were added to the west wall of the gym, and two AMC logos were added to the playing floor.

The sports medicine facility has been moved to a larger, more modern location. The previous Chellie Club is now the site of the athletics training room, where student-athletes and visiting teams can receive the medical treatment they need before, during and after contests.

The entrance to Hinkhouse has a new look as well. Visitors are now be able to purchase tickets at a ticket window located just to the west of the Hinkhouse front entrance. The lobby area is now equipped with a new concession stand. Cash and credit cards are now accepted for all ticket sales and concession stand items.

As I write this article, I am sitting in a hotel room in Dallas, Texas, preparing to meet Cottey alumnae and P.E.O. sisters at a series of meetings, meals and gatherings over the next few days. When I arrived last night, I listened to a live stream of Cottey's Chamber Choir performing their fall concert, and this morning I joined a group of alumnae by Zoom during "Sea to Cottey C." This afternoon, before heading out for my first meeting, I watched a live stream of Cottey's basketball game taking place in Hinkhouse Center. Cottey's community – on and off campus – is active and thriving, and I am so grateful for all the opportunities I have had to connect with Cottey students, faculty, staff, alumnae and members of the P.E.O. Sisterhood during my first six months as president.





The guestion I have been asked most often during my first few months as president is "What most surprised you about Cottey?" My response has typically been that, while I assumed that Cottey had a strong community, I perhaps underestimated its strength. A top priority for me in the past six months has been to meet with and listen to our students, faculty and staff. Having met with at least twothirds of our students. I can attest to the fact that the word "community" was used most often to describe what students love most about Cottey. They value the academic community, particularly the professors who support and guide them on their pathways to discovery and success. They appreciate the P.E.O. Sisterhood, whose members cheer for their success, largely from afar. As one student said, "It is terrific to know there are all these women committed to my success, even though we have never met." Cottey students' peers and classmates become their family, and the bonds they develop will be, for many, the start of lifelong connections. "Suite life" is a significant aspect of the Cottey experience that reinforces those bonds, builds connections, and helps students create their home away from home. In the summer of 2023, with thanks to our Board of Trustees for approving the funding, we will air condition P.E.O. Hall, ensuring that all our residence halls offer students the same level of comfort, particularly

during the first six weeks of the year and the final few weeks of the spring semester, when students are trying to settle in, start their semesters, and concentrate on their studies during final exams.

Students at Cottey have told me that they also greatly appreciate the many opportunities they have to develop leadership skills, to pursue internships and study abroad opportunities, and to participate in Cottey's storied traditions. Our students recognize that these experiences are distinctive and expansive, available because of Cottey's commitment to helping students see their own incredible potential. I'm particularly looking forward to accompanying more than 70 students to Vienna, Austria, this March. Many of these students will be headed abroad for the first time: for a few, it will even be their first time on a plane. Experiencing a different culture, exploring a new city, navigating public transportation in an unfamiliar language – with their Cottey classmates, faculty, and staff for support - will be an eyeopening and, for some, a personally transformative experience. Given Cottey's commitment to ensuring our students become globally aware, this journey is an important step in developing an appreciation for experiences and backgrounds different than their own.

Now, is Cottey perfect? Certainly not. Members of our community have shared with me some of the ways we can improve to offer our students an even higher quality experience. These include ensuring inclusivity throughout our community, addressing issues of accessibility, enhancing aspects of the studentathlete experience, rebuilding our post-Covid (can we say that?) international student numbers, and ensuring we can meet the everexpanding need for technology across campus. These are achievable goals and provide the Cottey community with the chance to work together for the betterment of our community. With such a dedicated faculty, caring staff, extensive alumnae and P.E.O. support, and talented students who are eager to learn and grow, we have tremendous potential to build on our strong foundation. I am truly excited for the opportunities that lie ahead.


New Ways to "Cottey C" Alumnae Around the World


'Duck'umenting **History**

'We made so many close friendships that have lasted ever since. Those bonds are special.'


'We want to help future generations experience the same opportunities and relationships we found at Cottey.'

EDUCATION



In August, Cottey College opened the Jann Rudd Weitzel Education Lab in honor of its recently retired 12th president. The education lab is a newly remodeled space in the lower level of the Blanche Skiff Ross Memorial Library.

The new lab is geared toward the education program and features a state-of-the-art teaching room, observation room, resource

room, and faculty offices. The teaching room is designed to serve both of Cottey's education degree programs— elementary and secondary education. The room is equipped with recording technology, a key feature that allows students

to study themselves as they develop a teaching identity.

"As an educator for almost 50 years, I recognize the importance of preservice teachers having opportunities to observe and learn from professional educators. I also recognize the importance of quality educators entering our workforce and making a difference in the lives of young students across the

nation," said Dr. Weitzel.

In total, teacher candidates have taught 28 unique lessons in the education lab over the course of the fall 2022 semester. Total attendance during these teaching events was around 300 (students, faculty, and community

members). Lessons incorporated utilizing our new smartboard and digital collaboration areas, as well as custom spaces. One such space was the reading corner. Dr. Kristina Adams, assistant professor and coordinator of education, elaborated on the reading corner's utility:

"This education lab has really allowed us to simulate the experience of being a teacher. For example, our elementary teacher candidates use our reading corner to teach lessons. The teachers-in-training have students sit on a rug and read to them. After the story, students walk to an easel, one at a time, and write their thoughts about the reading. This is exactly what someone would expect to see in a real elementary school, yet it was on a college campus!"

This education lab

represents Cottey's continued focus on adding spaces designed to meet the needs of our students. As an institution, we are always evaluating what we offer our students and how we can aid them in reaching their goals. Reflecting on her time at Cottey, Dr. Weitzel

said, "I was honored to serve as president for seven years. My favorite times were those spent with our students, witnessing their growth from the moment they began their studies at Cottey until they walked across the stage to receive their diplomas. I feel blessed to have this facility named after me."

COTTEY'S MUSICAL SINGS ITS WAY TO SUCCESS

The Cottey College theatre department presented Disney's Descendants: The Musical on November 4 and 5. This was Cottey's first musical performed in the Haidee and Allen Wild Center for the Arts and had over 650 in-person audience members.

The musical was also one of the theatre department's largest productions. The cast and crew consisted of 55 students: 34 actors and 21 crew members, assistant stage managers, ushers, designers, board operators, and various other production roles.

The director, Professor Laura Chaney, said:
This is the first year our program has offered a
bachelor's degree in theatre, and I am thrilled that so
many students chose to be involved in the production.
To have this many students interested in the performing
arts is fantastic and speaks to the importance of art in
our lives. Many of these students are not theatre majors
but participated because it brought them joy to work
on something creative. This is the ideal outcome and
evidence of a liberal arts education working to bridge
curriculum and provide access to other concentrations
outside one's intended studies.

In its first year, Cottey's theatre major has 15 students and offers a Bachelor's of Arts in theatre with two degree tracks. The first track is a general focus in theatre, which seeks to provide students the foundation to pursue careers in acting, design, stage management, directing, and the entertainment industry. The second track is theatre as an agent of social change and allows students to explore the history, potential, and skills necessary for the art of theatre to incite social change.

Cottey's production of Disney's Descendants: The Musical was entered into the Kennedy Center American College Theater Festival (KCACTF), adjudicated by two theater professionals. The production received very positive feedback and was held for consideration for re-mounting at the regional KCACTF festival in Des Moines, Iowa, in January 2023. Additionally, the production was chosen to participate in the costume parade at the festival.



Additionally, the respondents selected three students to audition for the Irene Ryan Acting Scholarships with partners. The students selected are Sasha Smith (Mal), Abigail Kohout (Evie), and Klair Soukup (Ben). Five student actors were also encouraged to audition for the Irene Ryan scholarships: Ken Donovan (Jay), Tessa Feazel (Audrey), Taylor Jordan (Maleficent), Mamie Watt (Chad), and Dyllen Andrews (Royal Page).

Student designers and stage managers will travel to Des Moines and showcase their work at the design Expo and receive professional feedback and possible awards in the areas of Poster and Hair Design (Taylor Jordan), Makeup Design (E Blaha), Allied Prop Design (Mamie Watt, Bayley Wilson, Greta Hundtofte), and Stage Management (Kordelia Taylor).

Sasha Smith, who took on the lead role, remarked, "I had to focus and learn how to manage my time to be able to learn the lines and fully become Mal, the daughter of Maleficent, as well as choreograph and teach the other cast members the dances. It was really rewarding and fun, and everyone worked together to the best of their ability to make the show come to life."







FACULTY NEWS



Dr. Ganga Fernando, professor of chemistry, worked at the local 3M forensic chemistry lab as a research fellow from June to August. She applied for this fellowship to gain a better understanding of high-end, fast-paced lab environments. Dr. Fernando

paid particular attention to the ways 3M employees applied the same chemistry principles she teaches in her classes to their work inside the 3M lab. As the Iva Corpstein Chair of the chemistry department, Dr. Fernando was provided funding to support her summer project.



Dr. Kowoon Lee, adjunct assistant professor of music, served as a jury member for the 2022 Indonesia International Young Musician Award in October. This competition is fully virtual and open to young musicians worldwide. Dr. Lee

enjoyed adjudicating the performances of the participants and gave online master classes to the winners of the 2022 IIYMA in November 2022. She enjoys supporting this competition because it inspires young musicians to share their musical talents with the world.



Jo Byrnes, professor of dance, attended the National Dance Education Organization's annual conference in Atlanta, Georgia, October 29–31. She participated in 26 sessions ranging from "Land to Water Yoga" to "Implicit Bias in Teaching Dance."



Peter Carver, assistant professor of speech and theatre, performed the roles of Bill Allenson in Einstein and the Polar Bear in May and Mr. Pippet in Suite Surrender in October for the CCPA at the Fox

Theater in downtown Nevada. Professor Carver also portrayed the late Cottey music professor Dr. Edouard Blitz in the Deepwood Cemetery Tour, a fundraising event for the Vernon County Historical Association in October.



Dr. Sarah Quick, associate professor of anthropology, contributed research, sang, and narrated the spring Chamber Singers program "Indigenous Voices." It took place on Cottey's campus last April and focused on




Nancy (Wátrud) Hoium
