The group of advisors represented diverse levels of familiarity and experience with the Gilman Program, providing a valuable forum for sharing insights, networking, and discussing strategies to enhance support for Gilman applicants, recipients, and alumni on campuses nationwide.

The Benjamin A. Gilman International Scholarship Program, funded by the U.S. Department of State, aims to broaden the scope of study abroad opportunities for American undergraduate students, particularly those with financial need. By offering financial assistance, the program helps

remove economic barriers, making international experiences more accessible for students who may not otherwise have the opportunity.
