




Students in the ENG 291: The Great Gatsby at 100 class traveled to Montgomery, Alabama, October 23-26, 2025, to visit sites connected to Zelda and Scott Fitzgerald, and to tour civil rights museums.

Zelda Fitzgerald was born and raised in Montgomery, and she and Scott lived there from 1931-32. The house where they lived is now an AirBnB attached to the Scott and Zelda Fitzgerald Museum, so we got to stay where the Fitzgeralds actually lived!

We had a very informative tour of the Fitzgerald Museum and were able to talk with a couple of Fitzgerald scholars who shared the personal histories of and anecdotes about the Fitzgeralds when they lived in Montgomery. We then did a driving tour of Montgomery and saw key places in Zelda and Scott's lives, including the famous Court Square Fountain where Zelda allegedly jumped in and went for a swim! (We did not follow her example!) We also went to pay homage at the old Montgomery Country Club where Zelda and Scott met. Unfortunately, a fire destroyed the club, and in its place sits a Sonic. Nevertheless, we got happy-hour-priced drinks and toasted to the couple!

We then visited the Montgomery Museum of Fine Arts to see one of Zelda's paintings. Zelda was not only a writer, but she was a skilled dancer and painter as well. To conclude our Fitzgerald tour, we went to Oakwood Cemetery where we tried to find the Fitzgerald family plot (Zelda and Scott are buried in Maryland, but the cemetery includes a marker for them, as well as the graves of a number of Zelda's family members.). Alas, we had no luck, but we did get to see the grave of Hank Williams!

Since we had spent time in the class studying race in the 1920s, we devoted part of the trip to civil rights history. We visited the "Mothers of Gynecology Monument," an outdoor museum and monument dedicated to "Anarcha, Lucy, and Betsey, the enslaved experimental subjects of the so-called 'father of gynecology,' J. Marion Sims."

We spent a significant part of Friday to The Legacy Museum, an incredible site that "tells the story of slavery in America and its legacy through interactive media, first-person narratives, world-class art, and data-rich exhibits." From there, we went to the Freedom Rides Museum, located in the Greyhound Bus Station where the Freedom Riders were met with violence in 1961.

The Civil Rights Memorial Center was our next stop. A project of the Southern Poverty Law Center, the center "is one of Alabama's premier civil rights sites and serves as the interpretive center for the Civil Rights Memorial, which honors the martyrs of the movement and inspires visitors to continue the march for racial equity and social justice." We finished the day with a visit to Dr. Martin Luther King Junior's church, the Dexter Avenue King Memorial Baptist Church. Although we did not have time to visit the Rosa Parks Musuem, we did get to see several statues dedicated to Parks throughout the city.


