


Jorge Dioses

On November 15, Dr. Dioses and students Nina Kantorek, Pasnadge Matara, and Saya Kito attended the 2025 MAKO Undergraduate Research Conference at Missouri State University.

The presentations at the conference covered a variety of topics in mathematics like a winning strategy for a board game, a study of mathematical beliefs and anxiety in college students, applications of combinatorics to parking, a proof of a theorem about polynomials, and more.

Students in US Environmental History (HIS/ENV 320) recently visited Republic Services Prairie View Regional Waste Landfill in Lamar, as part of their study of industrial-scale waste management systems that "digest" the rubbish of consumer society.

The landfill operations and environmental managers explained to students that the "cells" where trash is buried last about ten years before they are full. To protect the ground water, each cell has a thick bottom layer of compacted soil or clay, on top of which lies a durable plastic membrane.

Next is a drainage layer that directs the flow of toxic wastewater (leachate) so it can be safely treated. Heavy machinery compacts the trash that arrives daily, compressing it to a density of over 1000 pounds per cubic yard. When a cell is full, a layer of clay and soil is placed on top and then planted with vegetation.

Because decomposing garbage produces methane—one of the most potent greenhouse gases—the landfill captures the methane and processes it in a facility like the one in the photo. In the case of this site, the methane is then used by the city of Lamar to generate electricity.

While the landfill is managed in ways deemed sustainable, students recognize that reducing waste in the first place should be a priority. Participating students were Lindsay Abegg, Cassidy Barker, Gibsun Harkins, Riley Severance Grace VanEngen, and Alice Williams.
